



In March, 2001, the population of the three-county area around the Target Zone was over 160,000 souls. Grafton County was estimated at 78,277, for Orange County it was 27,924 and Windsor County was 55,444. With 277 (in 38 towns and one city, Lebanon, Grafton is the most developed of the three. Lebanon (12,395) is the largest population center, followed by the five districts of Hartford VT with a population of 10,200.



With a 1997 US population of 272,115,000, there was a national total of 756,710 Physicians. Of these, 665,249 were "active" (practicing over 20 hours a week) Non-Federal Physicians, leaving a ratio of 245.8 per 100,000 population. This was up from 240.0 in 1996, and if including those on Federal service (for a total of 663,943) gave a ratio of 246.2/100K.

While there is some use in knowing the number of military personnel available to the Response Coordinators, the military's strength is in their units. Furthermore, they will be deployed as units or Task Forces made up from these units.

In the 21st century, Reservists and National Guardsmen can travel quite far to their units. In the event of a crisis, personnel may not be able to reach their units. Furthermore, many units will not be at their authorized strengths. This is why it is important to know WHAT a unit can do for the Response Coordinators, and how well/how much they can do it.
